I sometimes marvel at how that one phrase has stayed with me for such a long time, and what a profound effect it has had on my life. That message more than anything else is the reason that I ended up 10,000 miles from "home".

It is now 10 years since I left the Faroe Islands, located in the North Atlantic. They are about half the size of Rhode Island with only 49,000 inhabitants. Taking a step of faith, I was feeling led to go to New Tribes Missions (NTM) Missionary Training Center in England. I had no idea where God would call me after I was done with the training, but I was sure that God would show me when the time was ready.

Along the way I met my wife, Corine, who is from the Netherlands. We are a mission team and God has led us to Thailand where we have lived for 5 years. Our son Eli Samuel was born here. Have there been struggles? Yes, many. Would we want to be anywhere else? No. This is where God has us and we have no plan of leaving. We have only one life to live and for now this is where God wants us to live it.

While the tasks that we do are many and different the reason that we do them is the same, to serve Him where He has placed us. The last year we have been working with a local Christian foundation called the R.E.A.D. Foundation (Resources for Education, Awareness & Development). I work as a translation coordinator. At the moment I have the privilege of working together with Tu who is translating Christian material for persecuted Khmu believers and Adjaan Praphaan who translates Gospel materials into Thai.

Please pray for our ministry here in Thailand. Pray that God will continue to make us a light and use us where we are. Pray that we will develop deep friendships with the people around us. e

Joel Runa comes from a poor family. He is 20 years old and has eleven siblings. Unable to complete school due to lack of finances, he got involved in drinking, marijuana, riots and gang fighting. He worked as a laborer, carrying sacks of rice to survive and help his family, but due to his personal needs and poor lifestyle choices, he has not been a help them.

We met recently when we held a youth discipleship camp. He displayed a good attitude and a willingness to learn and to change. He shared with me that he was

tired of making wrong choices and was willing to give up his life of sin and darkness. Joel encountered the Lord Jesus Christ personally and was filled with God's love and assurance that his sins are forgiven. He expressed the joy and the freedom he felt and was hungry to read and hear from the Word of God.

Transformation continues to take place in his life. No more drinking, drugs, fighting or hanging out with the wrong kind of friends. Our family has chosen to sponsor him in school and he is now in high school and doing well. He loves to serve in the church and lead worship. He prays regularly, listens to the Word, and is faithful in his studies. Joel is a man of God, a leader of his generation, a future evangelist, pastor, and preacher of God's Word.

Last year his family faced a challenge. His brother was hospitalized, and due to hospital and medical bills, they were forced to sell their house. Therefore, they don't have a place to live and are scattered throughout the community. This is the tragic reality of poverty.

Jan and his wife, Grace, and daughter, Precious, serve in General Santos City in the south of the Philippines. Theirs is a ministry of hope and reconciliation among the very poor of the community.
